

Palm Sunday (Sunday, March 28)

Palm Sunday is the day that Christians observe the triumphal entry of Christ into Jerusalem. Crowds of people greeted him at the city gates with waving palms as the King of the Jews. One short week later, he would be hung upon the cross at Golgotha.

The service begins with the Liturgy of the Palms outside the main sanctuary doors on the Saratoga St. entrance.

Tennebrae (Wednesday, March 31): 7:30PM

Tenebrae means "shadows" in Latin. It is a service of word, light and sound. When you arrive for worship you will see two groups of candles lit on the altar table. As readings are read the candles on the altar will be gradually extinguished until the very end of the service when the last candle left lit is removed from the worship space and the whole sanctuary is left in darkness. At that point a loud crash will (should) shatter the silence of the sanctuary. Then, after a moment, the last candle is returned to the sanctuary and the worshippers depart in silence. The gradual darkening of the sanctuary and the crashing noise symbolizes the apparent victory of death, darkness, and chaos over Jesus Christ on the cross. The final candle being removed and returned, symbolizes the truth that through Jesus' death, God gained victory over all the powers of evil. The Light was not overcome.

Maundy Thursday (Thursday, April 1): 6:00PM

Maundy Thursday communion celebrates the humility of Jesus with a ceremonial foot washing. Jesus is the King of Kings and Lord of Lord's and yet on the night before he died, during the Last Supper, he knelt down and one by one washed his disciples' feet. He did this to show his disciples and to show you and me how to serve one another with humility and love, being willing even to stoop to the most menial tasks. Maundy Thursday is the last chance for communion until the Great Vigil.

Good Friday (Friday, April 2): noon At about 3pm on Friday of Holy Week he lifted his eyes up to heaven from the cross and breathed out his last. "It is finished" he said. He was not only referring to his life, but he was also referring to his mission to deal with and defeat once and for all sin, death, and Satan.

Stations of The Cross (Friday, April 2): 7:30PM

This is a solemn service. The participants walk through the stations of the cross by candlelight, hearing a brief reading at each, and exit the sanctuary in silence.

The Great Vigil of Easter (Saturday, April 3):

7:30PM Along with Tenebrae, the Easter Vigil is one of the most ancient services of the Church. It is the most important service of the entire year and it is the first service of Easter. The service begins in total darkness—the lights of the sanctuary are out and not a candle is burning. Then a fire is lit in a firepot the center of the nave and from that flame all the candles in the sanctuary are lit and the hand-candles in the congregation. Then come readings and psalms, said and sung, by singers and by the whole congregation. The sermon follows and then the first Communion of Easter. The Great Vigil begins at 8:00pm in the sanctuary.

Easter Day (Sunday, April 4): This is the day Christians celebrate and proclaim the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ. There will be music, preaching, smells and bells. Service times are at 8:00am and 10:30am.

The Liturgy of the Palms and Holy Eucharist

Celebrant Hosanna to the Son of David, the King of Israel.

People Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Dear brothers and sisters, from the beginning of Lent until now we have been preparing our hearts by repentance and self-sacrifice. Today, with the whole Church, we herald the beginning of the celebration of the Paschal Mystery. On this day our Lord Jesus Christ entered Jerusalem and was welcomed as King with palms and shouts of praise. Today we greet him as our King, though we know his crown was a crown of thorns, and his throne a cross.

Therefore, I invite you to follow our Lord this Holy Week, from his triumphal entry, through his suffering and death, to the glory of his resurrection.

Celebrant The Lord be with you. **People And with your spirit.**

Celebrant Let us pray.

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. *Amen.*

Celebrant The Holy Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Mark 11:1-11

¹¹ Now when they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples ² and said to them, "Go into the village in front of you, and immediately as you enter it you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it. ³ If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' say, 'The Lord has need of it and will send it back here immediately.'" ⁴ And they went away and found a colt tied at a door outside in the street, and they untied it. ⁵ And some of those standing there said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶ And they told them what Jesus had said, and they let them go. ⁷ And they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it, and he sat on it. ⁸ And many spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut from the fields. ⁹ And those who went before and those who followed were shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! ¹⁰ Blessed is the coming kingdom of our father David! Hosanna in the highest!"

¹¹ And he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple.

Celebrant The Gospel of the Lord.

People Praise to you, Lord Christ.

Celebrant The Lord be with you. **People And with your spirit.**

Celebrant Let us pray.

We praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was hailed as King by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Sanctify these branches with your blessing, we humbly pray, that they may be for us signs of his victory. Grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

Celebrant Hosanna to the Son of David, the King of Israel.

People Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

People In the name of Christ. Amen.


During the procession all hold palms or branches, and appropriate hymns or anthems are sung.

Celebrant Let us pray.

Almighty and everlasting God, in your tender love for us you sent your Son our Savior Jesus Christ to take upon himself our nature, and to suffer death upon the cross, giving us the example of his great humility: Mercifully grant that we may walk in the way of his suffering, and come to share in his resurrection; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.

The Lessons

The people sit for the reading of the lessons

The First Lesson Isaiah 52:13-53:12

¹³Behold, my servant shall act wisely; he shall be high and lifted up, and shall be exalted. ¹⁴As many were astonished at you—his appearance was so marred, beyond human semblance, and his form beyond that of the children of mankind— ¹⁵ so shall he sprinkle many nations. Kings shall shut their mouths because of him, for that which has not been told them they see, and that which they have not heard they understand.

53 Who has believed what he has heard from us? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed? ² For he grew up before him like a young plant, and like a root out of dry ground; he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, and no beauty that we should desire him. ³

He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows and acquainted with grief; and as one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not.

⁴Surely he has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. ⁵But he was pierced for our transgressions; he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with his wounds we are healed. ⁶All we like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—every one—to his own way; and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

⁷He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he opened not his mouth. ⁸By oppression and judgment he was taken away; and as for his generation, who considered that he was cut off out of the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people?

⁹And they made his grave with the wicked and with a rich man in his death, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.

¹⁰ Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him; he has put him to grief; when his soul makes an offering for guilt, he shall see his offspring; he shall prolong his days; the will of the Lord shall prosper in his hand. ¹¹ Out of the anguish of his soul he shall see and be satisfied; by his knowledge shall the righteous one, my servant, make many to be accounted righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. ¹² Therefore I will divide him a portion with the many, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong, because he poured out his soul to death and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and makes intercession for the transgressors.

Psalm 22:1-11

22 My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

The Second Lesson Philippians 2:5-11

⁵ Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, ⁷ but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. ⁸ And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

The Gospel John 19:38-42

The Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John.

The people remain seated

Narrator Then they led Jesus from the house of Caiaphas to the governor's headquarters. It

was early morning. They themselves did not enter the governor's

headquarters, so that they would not be defiled, but could eat the Passover. So

Pilate went outside to them

Pilate What accusation do you bring against this man?

The Elders
If this man were not doing evil, we would not have delivered him over to you.

Pilate Take him yourselves and judge him by your own law.

 Narrator This was to fulfill the word that Jesus had spoken to show by what kind of death

he was going to die. So Pilate entered his headquarters again and called Jesus

and said to him,

Pilate Are you the King of the Jews?

Jesus Do you say this of your own accord, or did others say it to you about me?

Pilate Am I a Jew? Your own nation and the chief priests have delivered you over to

me. What have you done?

Jesus My kingdom is not of this world. If my kingdom were of this world, my servants

would have been fighting, that I might not be delivered over to the Jews. But my

kingdom is not from the world.

Pilate So you are a king?

Jesus You say that I am a king. For this purpose I was born and for this purpose I have

come into the world—to bear witness to the truth. Everyone who is of the

truth listens to my voice.

Pilate What is truth?

Narrator After he had said this, he went back outside to the Jews and told them,

Pilate I find no guilt in him. But you have a custom that I should release one man for

you at the Passover. So do you want me to release to you the King of the Jews?"

Narrator They cried out again,

The Elders Not this man, but Barabbas!

Narrator Now Barabbas was a robber. Then Pilate took Jesus and flogged him. And the

soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and put it on his head and arrayed

him in a purple robe. They came up to him, saying,

Soldiers Hail, King of the Jews!

Narrator and struck him with their hands. Pilate went out again and said to them,

Pilate See, I am bringing him out to you that you may know that I find no guilt in him.

Narrator So Jesus came out, wearing the crown of thorns and the purple robe. Pilate said

to them,

Pilate Behold the man!

Narrator When the chief priests and the officers saw him, they cried out,

The Elders Crucify him, crucify him!

Pilate Take him yourselves and crucify him, for I find no guilt in him.

The Elders We have a law, and according to that law he ought to die because he has made

himself the Son of God.

Narrator When Pilate heard this statement, he was even more afraid. He entered his

headquarters again and said to Jesus,

Pilate Where are you from?

Narrator But Jesus gave him no answer.

Pilate You will not speak to me? Do you not know that I have authority to release you

and authority to crucify you?

Jesus You would have no authority over me at all unless it had been given you from

above. Therefore he who delivered me over to you has the greater sin.

Narrator From then on Pilate sought to release him, but the Jews cried out,

a king opposes Caesar.

Narrator So when Pilate heard these words, he brought Jesus out and sat down on the

judgment seat at a place called The Stone Pavement, and in Aramaic

Gabbatha. Now it was the day of Preparation of the Passover. It was about the

sixth hour. He said to the Jews,

Pilate Behold your King!

The Elders Away with him, away with him, crucify him!

Pilate Shall I crucify your King?
The Elders We have no king but Caesar.

Narrator So he delivered him over to them to be crucified.

The Congregation stands if able.

Narrator So they took Jesus, and he went out, bearing his own cross, to the place called

The Place of a Skull, which in Aramaic is called Golgotha. There they crucified him, and with him two others, one on either side, and Jesus between them.

Pilate also wrote an inscription and put it on the cross. It read, "Jesus of

Nazareth, the King of the Jews." Many of the Jews read this inscription, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and it was written in Aramaic,

in Latin, and in Greek. So the chief priests of the Jews said to Pilate,

The Elders Do not write, 'The King of the Jews,' but rather, 'This man said, I am King of the

Jews.'

Pilate What I have written I have written.

Narrator When the soldiers had crucified Jesus, they took his garments and divided them

into four parts, one part for each soldier; also his tunic. But the tunic was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom, so they said to one another,

Soldiers Let us not tear it, but cast lots for it to see whose it shall be.

Narrator This was to fulfill the Scripture which says, "They divided my garments among

them, and for my clothing they cast lots." So the soldiers did these things, but standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the

disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to his mother,

Jesus Woman, behold, your son!

Narrator Then he said to the disciple,

Jesus Behold, your mother!

Narrator And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home. After this, Jesus,

knowing that all was now finished, said (to fulfill the Scripture),

Jesus I thirst.

Narrator A jar full of sour wine stood there, so they put a sponge full of the sour wine on a

hyssop branch and held it to his mouth. When Jesus had received the sour wine,

he said,

Jesus It is finished,

Narrator and he bowed his head and gave up his spirit. Since it was the day of

Preparation, and so that the bodies would not remain on the cross on the Sabbath (for that Sabbath was a high day), the Jews asked Pilate that their legs might be broken and that they might be taken away. So the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first, and of the other who had been crucified with him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that he was already dead, they did not break his legs. But one of the soldiers pierced his side with a spear, and at once there came out blood and water. He who saw it has borne witness—his testimony is true, and he knows that he is telling the truth—that you also may believe. For these things took place that the Scripture might be fulfilled: "Not one of his bones will be broken." And again another Scripture says, "They will look on him whom they have pierced." After these things Joseph of Arimathea, who was a disciple of Jesus, but secretly for fear of the Jews, asked Pilate that he might take away the body of Jesus, and Pilate gave him permission. So he came and took away his body. Nicodemus also, who earlier had come to Jesus by night, came bringing a mixture of myrrh and aloes, about seventy-five pounds in weight. So they took the body of Jesus and bound it in linen cloths with the spices, as is the burial custom of the Jews. Now in the place where he was crucified there was a garden, and in the garden a new tomb in which no one had yet been laid. So because of the Jewish day of Preparation, since the tomb was close at hand, they laid Jesus there.
