Palm Sunday (Sunday, April 13th, 2025)

Palm Sunday is the day that Christians observe the triumphal entry of Christ into Jerusalem. Crowds of people greeted him at the city gates with waving palms as the King of the Jews. One short week later, he would be hung upon the cross at Golgotha.

This year, the 10:30 service begins with the Liturgy of the Palms at the street sign, and processes through the parking lot into the sanctuary doors on Saratoga Street.

Tenebrae (Wednesday, April 16) 8:00PM Tenebrae means "shadows" in Latin. It is a service of word, light and sound. When you arrive for worship you will see two groups of candles lit on the altar table. As readings are read the candles on the altar will be gradually extinguished until the very end of the service when the last candle left lit is removed from the worship space and the whole sanctuary is left in darkness. At that point a loud crash will (should) shatter the silence of the sanctuary. Then, after a moment, the last candle is returned to the sanctuary, and the worshippers depart in silence. The gradual darkening of the sanctuary and the crashing noise symbolizes the apparent victory of death, darkness, and chaos over Jesus Christ on the cross. The final candle being removed and returned, symbolizes the truth that through Jesus' death, God gained victory over all the powers of evil. The Light was not overcome.

Maundy Thursday (Thursday, April 17th) 6:30PM Maundy Thursday communion celebrates the humility of Jesus with a ceremonial foot washing. Jesus is the King of Kings and Lord of Lord's and yet on the night before he died, during the Last Supper, he knelt down and one by one washed his disciples' feet. He did this to show his disciples, and to show you and me, how to serve one another with humility and love, being willing even to stoop to the most menial tasks. Maundy Thursday is the last chance for communion until the Great Vigil.

Good Friday (Friday, April 18th) noon At about 3pm on Friday of Holy Week he lifted his eyes up to heaven from the cross and breathed out his last. "It is finished" he said. He was not only referring to his life, but he was also referring to his mission to deal with and defeat once and for all sin, death, and Satan.

Stations of The Cross (Friday, April 18th) 8:00PM This is a solemn service. The participants walk through the stations of the cross by candlelight, hearing a brief reading at each, and exit the sanctuary in silence.

The Great Vigil of Easter (Saturday, April 19th) 8:00PM Along with Tenebrae, the Easter Vigil is one of the most ancient services of the Church. It is the most important service of the entire year and it is the first service of Easter. The service begins in total darkness—the lights of the sanctuary are out and not a candle is burning. Then a fire is lit in a firepot at the center of the nave and from that flame all the candles in the sanctuary and the hand-candles in the congregation are lit. Then come readings and psalms, said and sung, by singers and by the whole congregation. The sermon follows and then the first Communion of Easter. The Great Vigil begins at 8:00pm in the sanctuary. Make a Joyful Sound! During Easter Vigils in the distant past, it was a tradition for the congregation to ring bells at certain points in the service. We would like to reintroduce that tradition of congregational bell ringing during parts of our Easter Vigil service this year. The bells are rung from the moment the resurrection is announced during the service, through the song that follows, and then any time the word 'Alleluia' is said or sung for the remainder of the service. Anyone attending the Easter Vigil service is welcome to bring small bells to ring at this time. Please consider bringing the type of bell that you wouldn't mind another person ringing right beside or behind you, as the idea is to make a unique and joyous sound during specific parts of the service.

Easter Flowers Each year Good Shepherd decorates the altar for the Easter Vigil and Easter Day with many flowers.

This year, we continue the new tradition of inviting the congregation to join us. If you would like to donate toward the purchase of flowers, please make a separate contribution earmarked "Easter Flowers" on any Sunday between now and Palm Sunday. For each \$10 that you give, please take a flower home after the 10:30 Easter Day service.

Laetare Sunday Today, March 30th, is set apart in the season of Lent as a Refreshment Sunday called Laetare Sunday. Refreshment Sundays are a pause during the seasons of Advent and Lent that shift the focus from one of somber penitence to expectant waiting with joy. The word Laetare means, 'rejoice!'. This Sunday does not mark the end of our Lenten disciplines but reminds us that we are being led toward celebration at Easter Sunday. As we are more than halfway through Lent, we hold fast to the hope that at the end of these somber days we will rejoice. Laetare Sunday mirrors the dual truths all Christians hold: we are more sinful that we know, but we have been forgiven by Christ and stand redeemed. In Christ we can laugh while we weep and stand unshakably on hope while we mourn. Traditionally, roses replace the penitential Lenten purple. Rose represents rejoicing amidst repentance, a visual reminder of the hope of Christ's Resurrection.
